Easton Office Ribbon-Cutting

On September 14, the Conference celebrated the opening of a drop-in center in Easton. The event included speeches given by Tyler Martin, The Easton Housing Authority Executive Director, The Lehigh Conference of Churches' Executive Director, Abigail Goldfarb, guest Denise Guffy, and employee, David Watson. The event also included an open house, and an official ribbon cutting.

The Conference has provided rental assistance to Northampton county residents since 2015, however, the travel to Allentown for assessments and case mangers created a barrier to those residents seeking assistance. A partnership between the Easton Housing Authority (EHA) and the Conference will now allow for further continuum of care programming in this area.

The drop-in center, located in EHA's building at the at 40 N. Union St. Easton offers assistance for those affected by housing issues, bi-lingual case management, food, and referrals to other

agencies.

"The Easton Housing Authority has been very gracious in offering us this space. We excited to be in Easton and offer our services in a more accessible way," Executive Director Abigail Goldfarb said.

Services will be made available at the housing authority North Union Site at 40 N. Union St., Easton, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday. A Spanish– speaking on-site case manager will be available daily.

Mondays and Thursdays will feature case management and street outreach, with access to assistance from street outreach case managers.

Tuesdays will feature peer support services with guidance provided by certified recovery specialists and certified peer support professionals.

Wednesdays will focus on

employment and representative payee services, including employment navigation and pay services; and Friday will offer community-based case management with frontline public health workers.

A recent count shows there are 558 homeless students in the Allentown School District. How successful can they be without a home? How many more are trying to master algebra when tomorrow their possessions will be on the curb?

The greatest gift the Conference can give is the chance for our neighbors to stay in their home. This holiday season I invite you to join us in doing just that.

Client Stories

Allison

Allison became a member of the Community Based Case Management program the beginning of February this year. She was struggling with homelessness, mental and physical health concerns, as well as history of alcoholism. She had been hospitalized at LVH on the Behavioral Health Unit at the time.

Allison was discharged from LV hospital BHU the end of February, and a few days later was hospitalized at St. Luke's Lehighton Campus BHU. Allison remained hospitalized for two months while the hospital worked with her to become stable. Meanwhile her CBCM worked to find her a stable place to live.

Allison was also connected with a Social Determinants of Health Case Manager, who worked along with her CBCM Case Manager to help Allison succeed once she left the hospital.

Allison did return to the hospital briefly and was assigned additional supports. Allison now has a team of Case Workers from two agencies helping her remain out of the hospital and she is doing wonderful.

Franklin

Franklin left his job to take care of his ailing mother in 2019. He moved into her one-bedroom apartment and slept on the couch so, per her wish, she could stay in her home. Franklin's mother passed away in 2021 and after paying for her funeral, the remainder of his mother's life insurance policy allowed him to stay in the apartment they shared for another 4 months while he looked for a job.

When his funds were exhausted, Franklin had to leave his home. After about week sleeping on the streets, the Conference's Street Outreach Team connected him with bus passes, a tent, sleeping bag, and food.

Franklin not only received those items, but was linked with other services. With help from Outreach, he was able to locate a job that paid a wage that would allow him to sustain an apartment and move off the streets. The conference paid his first month rent and security deposit on a unit and also got him a new bed, love seat, and kitchen set.

Franklin is now thriving and is planning for the future. He has already received a promotion at work and plans to donate back to the Conference to help others that are in same situation he was.
